 <p>Identities and relationships</p>	<p>Possible explorations: identity; beliefs and values; personal, physical, mental, social and spiritual health; human relationships including families, friends, communities and cultures; what it means to be human</p>
 <p>Orientation in space and time</p>	<p>Possible explorations: personal histories; homes and journeys; turning points in humankind; discoveries; explorations and migrations of humankind; the relationships between and the interconnectedness of individuals and civilizations from personal, local and global perspectives</p>
 <p>Personal and cultural expression</p>	<p>Possible explorations: the ways in which we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs and values; the ways in which we reflect on, extend and enjoy our creativity; our appreciation of the aesthetic</p>
 <p>Scientific and technical innovation</p>	<p>Possible explorations: the natural world and its laws; the interaction between people and the natural world; how humans use their understanding of scientific principles; the impact of scientific and technological advances on communities and environments; the impact of environments on human activity; how humans adapt environments to their needs.</p>
 <p>Globalization and sustainability</p>	<p>Possible explorations: the interconnectedness of human-made systems and communities; the relationship between local and global processes; how local experiences mediate the global; the opportunities and tensions provided by world-interconnectedness; the impact of decision-making on humankind and the environment</p>
 <p>Fairness and development</p>	<p>Possible explorations: rights and responsibilities; the relationship between communities; sharing finite resources with other people and with other living things; access to equal opportunities; peace and conflict resolution</p>
